Population Estimates and Projections

POPULATION OVERVIEW



In 2024, there were **4,503** centenarians. This population is projected to increase to **16,804** by **2050**, a 273% change.

In 2024, **88 counties** have more people above the age of 60 and older than under the age of 18.

Demographic Snapshot (2022)

NC ranks 9th in total population nationally. NC also ranks 9th in the population of those age 65 and older.





Adults aged 85 and older are projected to experience the fastest growth in the state over the next 20 years.

Health and Wellness

of individuals aged 65 and older live with one or more chronic diseases, with 54% managing two or more chronic conditions.

34% of adults aged 65 and older report living with a disability.

Community Engagement and Civic Participation

While formal volunteering rates dropped from 2019 to 2021 in every demographic group, informal helping rates largely remained steady.

NC voters have become older, on average, over the last decade. **Nearly a quarter of all registered voters in 2023** were 66 and older (23.4%) compared to just 18.2% in 2013. As the Baby Boomer generation has aged, the proportion of older voters has grown, signifying Baby Boomers remain **one of the largest voting cohorts**.



Alzheimer's Disease in NC

In 2024, according to North Carolina Alzheimer's statistics, **210,500 adults aged 65 and older were diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease**, constituting **12% of the population** within that age group.



Food Insecurity and Malnutrition

NATIONAL TRENDS IN INFORMAL VOLUNTEERING (2019-21):

Baby boomers had the **highest rate** (59%) of all generations.

- In 2020, North Carolina had the 14th-highest rate of older adult food insecurity in the United States; nearly 7.7% of older adults aged 60 and older were food insecure.
- The annual costs of disease-associated malnutrition for adults aged 65 and older in North Carolina is **\$140,348,592**.

A caregiver is a person of any age who tends to the needs or concerns of a person with short- or long-term limitations due to illness, injury or disability.

Socio-Economic Characteristics (2022)

HOUSING AND LIVING ARRANGEMENTS



43% of housing units occupied by individuals aged 65 and older were single-person households.

27% of adults aged 65 and older lived alone, placing them at risk of social isolation and associated poor health outcomes.

POVERTY AND INCOME



One in 10 people aged 65 and older lived below the 100% poverty level and another 20% of the population 65 and older lived below the 100-199% poverty level.

Poverty thresholds stood at \$14,040 for individuals aged 65 and older and \$17,710 per household of two people with the householder aged 65.

EDUCATION



Among individuals aged 65 and older, 43% attained a high school education or less.

LABOR FORCE PARTICIPATION

of the population aged 65 and older actively participated in the labor force.

COMMUNITY LIVING

of individuals aged 65 and older lived in the community.



In households with individuals aged 65 and older, 86% possessed a computer, while 78% had a broadband internet subscription. These

figures underscore the critical need for enhancing technological literacy among older adults, including educating them about online scams, phishing attempts, and other cybersecurity risks.

KINSHIP CARE

45% of the estimated 80,928 grandparents responsible for grandchildren under 18 were aged 60 and older.

Healthcare Workforce Crisis

Research shows that from 2018 to 2028, North Carolina's long-term care sector will need to fill more than 186,000 openings in direct care, including nearly 21,000 new jobs



to meet rising demand and 165,500 jobs that become vacant as existing workers transfer to other occupations or exit the labor force.

Cost of Long-Term Care: North Carolina Statistics (2023)



National statistics revealed that seven out of 10 people will require long-term care services and support in their lifetime.



Based on the 2023 Genworth Cost of Care survey data, the median long-term care costs in North Carolina were as follows:
