**DEAR COUNTY DIRECTOR OF SOCIAL SERVICES**

**ATTENTION: COUNTY DIRECTORS**

**SUBJECT: TIME LIMITED FAMILY REUNIFICATION SERVICES**

The NC Division of Social Services (NCDSS) would like to inform you that effective June 30, 2013, the services known as Intensive Family Reunification Services (IFRS) will no longer be contracted in combination with Intensive Family Preservation Services. Family reunification service funds will be allocated directly to all local county Departments of Social Services (DSS) effective July 1, 2013. Intensive Family Preservation Services will continue as a competitive application, contract and regional service provision process.

“Time Limited Family Reunification Services” are funded under Title IV-B, Subpart 2 of the Social Security Act. Please see [http://www.ssa.gov/OP\\_Home/ssact/title04/0431.htm](http://www.ssa.gov/OP_Home/ssact/title04/0431.htm). The term “time-limited family reunification services” means the services and activities that are provided to a child that is removed from the child’s home and placed in a foster family home or a child care institution and to the parents or primary caregiver of such a child, in order to facilitate the reunification of the child safely and appropriately within a timely fashion, but only during the 15-month period that begins on the date that the child, pursuant to Section 475(5)(F), is considered to have entered foster care. Eligible services and activities include:

1. Individual, group, and family counseling;
2. Inpatient, residential, or outpatient substance abuse treatment services;
3. Mental health services;
4. Assistance to address domestic violence;
5. Services to provide temporary child care and therapeutic services for families, including crisis nurseries;
6. Peer-to-peer mentoring and support groups for parents and primary caregivers.
7. Services and activities designed to facilitate access to and visitation of children by parents and siblings.
8. Transportation to or from any of the services and activities listed above.

This will provide an opportunity for local county DSS to engage their staff, community partners and families they serve to assess the areas of greatest need and develop a plan for maximizing these funds in order to improve the outcomes of the children and families we serve. The Division has established a workgroup through the partnership with the NC Association of County Directors of Social Services to


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consider an appropriate county allocation funding formula, program requirements and any development of policy guidance to administer these services.
