


NC's Aging Population: Trends, Challenges and Opportunities



Activity: Fact or Fiction

- By 2030, 1 in every 4 Americans will be over 65.
- Women are more to take on caregiving roles (about 60% in US).
- Baby boomers represent the smallest generation in history due to declining birth rates during their time.
- Ageism is the systematic stereotyping and discrimination against people based on their age.
- Research shows physicians are less willing to treat suicidal older persons compared to younger patients, and believe suicidal ideation among older adults is normal.
- Older adults are less likely to adapt to new technologies and digital innovations.








Profile of Aging in NC

Projected Population Growth







Improves coordination of services


Provides framework to plan for 10+ years





Livable Community

A livable community is one that is **safe** and **secure**, has affordable and appropriate **housing** and **transportation options**, and offers **supportive community features** and services. Once in place, those resources **enhance personal independence**; allow residents to **age in place**; and **foster residents' engagement** in the community's civic, economic, and social life.





Executive Order 280



Executive Order 280: NC's Commitment to Building an Age Friendly State









EO 280- MPA

DHHS shall implement planning process with working groups to develop Multisector Plan for Aging

- Shall be led by Division of Aging and Adult Services and Division of Health Benefits
- Report shall be submitted to Governor no later than one year from date of EO

Protection of Vulnerable Adults

DHHS shall collaborate with the **Governor's Advisory Council on Aging** and other stakeholders to make recommendations to improve protection of vulnerable adults from maltreatment.



Summit on Nutrition Services for Older Adults

DHHS shall collaborate with the **Governor's Advisory Council on Aging** to convene a summit to study and make recommendations regarding **nutrition services** available to older adults statewide and improvements needed to reduce food insecurity, which helps prevent further declines in health conditions among people who are aging;



Broadband Access and Digital Literacy Services

The North Carolina Department of Information Technology (DIT) shall improve communication and outreach to the state's aging and older adult population as part of its continuing work to **expand broadband access** to ninety-eight percent (98%) of all North Carolina communities.



Caregiving Workforce Strategic Leadership Group

DHHS and North Carolina Department of Commerce shall convene a **Caregiving Workforce Strategic Leadership group** with representatives from across education, workforce, and economic development.

 Will develop and implement recommendations to better recruit and retain workers in behavioral health, direct care, and nursing

Other Directives

Improving Access to Outdoor Spaces for Older Adults

 The North Carolina Department of Natural and Cultural Resources (DNCR) shall improve and promote outdoor spaces and buildings for use by older adults.

Transportation for Older Adults

 The North Carolina Department of Transportation (DOT) shall build upon its success in offering public transportation coverage across the state by implementing additional projects that improve the coverage, quality, reliability, and convenience of public transportation.

Additional Cabinet Agency Work

Cabinet agencies directed to cooperate in implementation of EO

Not exhaustive of all state cabinet agency agefriendly planning efforts and programs and additional priorities will be identified by development of **Multisector Plan for Aging**


