


2. Aging Adults

Did you know that African American/Black, American Indian, and Hispanic/Latinx children in North Carolina are three times more likely to be in poverty than white children?

Did you know that chronic diseases are some of the leading causes of death in North Carolina?

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


5. Communicable Disease

Did you know that people of color in North Carolina are much more likely to be diagnosed with a communicable disease than whites?

6. Economic Wellbeing

Did you know that African American/Black, American Indian, and Hispanic/Latinx individuals are over two times more likely to be in poverty than whites?

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7. Health of People with Disabilities

What Matters to You?

Did you know that people with disabilities, regardless of race/ethnicity, are much more likely to have heart disease, diabetes, COPD, stroke, and depression than people without disabilities?

Caption Description: Discrimination, unequal access, and limited resources contribute to health disparities for people with disabilities. Tell us what matters to you. #NCDHHSOHE




8. Maternal and Infant Health

Did you know that African American/Black women are more likely than white women to die of a pregnancy-related cause?

Caption Description: Improving the health and well-being of parents and infants determines the health of our next generation. Tell us what matters to you. #NCDHHSOHE

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


9. Mental and Behavioral Health

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


11. Social Drivers of Health



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


